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Featured Figures of Speech

Simile

A comparison of two unlike things using the words "like" or "as." *Shoppers pushed and shoved like carnival bumper cars.*

Metaphor

A comparison of two unlike things implying that something is a dissimilar object or thing. The words "like" or "as" are not used Shoppers were carnival bumper cars, pushing and shoving against each other.

Personification

The figure of speech that gives human characteristics or actions to non-living things. Delightful aromas steaming from a cup of hot chocolate invited me to have a sip.

Hyperbole

A exaggeration that cannot possibly be true. There were at least a million presents stuffed under the tree.

Alliteration

The repetition of an initial consonant sound or of the same sound within several words. Suzanne sat silently on the sofa as Mother decorated the fireplace mantel.

Onomatopoeia

Words that represent sounds.

A blaring Beep! Beep! Beep! from the driveway announced our grandparent's arrival.
