Simile

A comparison of two unlike things using the words "like" or "as." The April Fools' prank left Mr. Hammonds as agitated as socks in a washing machine.

Metaphor

A comparison of two unlike things implying that something is a dissimilar object or thing. The words "like" or "as" are not used Laughter between two people is a hug with noise.

Personification

The figure of speech that gives human characteristics or actions to non-living things. Leaves danced in the breeze that blew through the trees.

Hyperbole

An exaggeration that cannot possibly be true. I have created, without a doubt, the best Easter basket in the history of the universe!

Alliteration

The repetition of an initial consonant sound or of the same sound within several words. *Kevin couldn't control his cantankerous kite, and it came crashing down.*
