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A Note from the author. . .

In harmony with the unabashed, juvenile behavior it solicits from all age groups the last day of October, the word *Halloween* is itself quite unique. Some say it goes all the way back to ancient Rome, but most pinpoint its origin to an old Celtic calendar where it was the last night of the year—the transition between the "lighter half" of the year (summer) and the "darker half" (winter). It was a fragile time, a night when both good and evil spirits could wander into the world of the living.

With pagan rituals and ideas in its ancestry, it spent its childhood in Old English. An early recognizable form is *Allhallow-even*, a Scottish shortening of an archaic word for "All-Hallows-Eve." The term *Halloween* first appeared in the 16th century (c 1556).

Lucky for us, it grew up to be a word with **two sets** of **double letters**, which makes it a perfect starting point for an activity focusing on this particular spelling anomaly.
