8.	bmmeer One who belongs to a club or organization.
9.	bourwr A hole or tunnel in the ground made by a fox, a rabbit, or similar animal.
10.	bceeirg A massive floating body of ice broken away from a glacier.
11.	bsoreeummc Difficult to handle because of weight or bulk.
12.	bungduyr A dark grayish to blackish red to dark purplish red or reddish brown.
13.	bsurt To break, break open, or fly apart with sudden force.
14.	bbbuerl The fat layer between the skin and muscle of whales and other cetaceans; to sob noisily; to utter while crying.
15.	bbboumlahtre A person who talks too much, especially indiscreetly; a gossip; a tattletale
16.	boers Not intoxicated or affected by the use of drugs; marked by seriousness, gravity, or solemnity of conduct or character.
