Words with Multiple Meanings Checking out the Animals

What do these three sentences have in common?

A fly zoomed past my nose and came to a screeching halt on my sandwich.

Herman went outside to fly his new kite. Grandmother is planning to fly into Dallas next Monday.



The word *fly*, of course. The thoughts expressed in the sentences are different, yet they use the same word and make perfect sense. That's because the word *fly* has more than one meaning. In the first sentence, it names an insect. In the second, it means to "soar through the air." In the third, it means "to travel on an airplane."
